The Apprentice of the Year recognises and rewards the achievements of exceptional apprentices in plastering and interior trades. There are two trade awards for Apprentice of the Year, one for plastering and one for interior trades.

Nominees need to have been working in the industry for at least 12 months. Entrants must have undertaken the relevant apprenticeship within the last two years.

Judges will be looking for examples of:

- · Commitment to personal development
- · Progression through skills and learning
- Contribution to the organisation or to a project
- · Personal qualities that make the individual stand out
- Contribution to teamwork

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Apprentice of the Year

Professional - Intermediate, Advanced, Higher and Degree level

Winners £450

The Apprentice of the Year recognises and rewards the achievements of exceptional apprentices undertaking a professional apprenticeship at intermediate, advanced, higher or degree level (eg Quantity Surveying, Construction Management, Site Supervision).

Nominees need to have been working in the industry for at least 12 months and have undertaken the relevant apprenticeship within the last two years.

Judges will be looking for examples of:

- Commitment to personal development
- Progression through skills and learning
- Contribution to the organisation
- · Personal qualities that make the individual stand out
- Contribution to teamwork

Professional Apprenticeship (this list is not exhaustive)

Business administration / IT / Marketing / Customer Service / Quantity Surveying / Site Supervision / Construction Management

Entry is by employer, college or independent training provider nomination.



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Student of the Year Plastering and Interior Trades

Winners £450

The Student of the Year recognises and rewards the achievements of exceptional individuals training in plastering and interior trades. There are two awards for Student of the Year, one for plastering and one for interior trades.

Nominees do not need to be employed but must have undertaken training within plastering and interior trades in the last two years.

Judges will be looking for examples of:

- Commitment to personal development
- · Progression through skills and learning
- Performance in practical work
- Personal qualities that make the individual stand out
- Perseverance to succeed in spite of personal difficulties

Entry is by college, employer or training provider nomination.





Colleges and Training Providers

Winners £1,500


This award is for independent training providers or colleges with full-time students and apprentices that demonstrate the highest standards in the delivery of training and qualifications for plastering and interior systems occupations. There will be two awards in this category based on student intake.

Judges will be looking for examples of:

- Why the nominated college/training provider should be recognised for achieving the highest standards in training
- · Qualities that make the organisation stand out
- Testimonials from employees, students and apprentices endorsing the stand out qualities and highest training standards of the college/training provider.

NOTE: Training Providers / Colleges are encouraged to enter their students / apprentices into the relevant category of the Training Awards. Whilst not mandatory, points will be awarded to those that do.

Occupational Areas:



Entry is by employer or trainee nomination, or college or independent training provider self-nomination.









This award recognises FIS members which have delivered outstanding benefits to both individuals and their organisation through their in-house training programmes.

Judges will be looking for examples of:

- Commitment to organisational development via the delivery of training
- · Contribution to the sector
- Organisational recognition awards and achievements
- Sector involvement, what does the organisation do that supports and promotes the sector
- How the organisations supports individuals on their training pathway
- Stand alone reasons for winning

This award recognises contributions to the development and long-term future of Fibrous and GRG Plasterwork and is open to:

- Architects and Specifiers
- Colleges and Training Providers
- Contractors
- Fibrous and GRG Workshops
- Property Owners

- Demonstration of leadership
- Exemplary performance of activities above and beyond the scope of responsibilities
- · Oualities that make the individual stand out

Entry is by employer or individual nomination.









This award recognises rising stars who are currently working in the finishes and interiors sector. The Rising Star award aims to shine a light on exceptional talent celebrating individuals who have demonstrated the highest level of excellence during their career journey.

We are looking for individuals that have shown innovative thinking, made a significant contribution to an organisation or project or otherwise demonstrated their ability to rise to the top.

Judges will be looking for examples of:

- Demonstrate innovative thinking and how they have made a difference to their projects or business
- · Ambitions and achievements
- How the individual stands out from the crowd and makes a real impact
- How the individual demonstrates professionalism, integrity, excellence and respect. This
 could be work-related, across the wider industry or amongst peers
- Personal qualities that make the individual stand out from others
- Testimonials (if self-nominated)
